Administrative/Biographical History

Richard Allen "Al" Moorman was born at Smith Center, Kansas on September 7, 1901 to Edgar Daniel and Mattie Fay (Curry) Moorman. He spent his early years as a growing musician. In 1923, he played and wrote music for a circus band. Later, he played with a group called "The Moonlight Serenaders". Al attended Kansas State University from 1921 to 1923 to get a degree and learn music. On March 8, 1925 he married Gertrude G. Gates at Kingman, Kansas. The ill health of his wife brought them to Colorado in 1938 where he taught music in Nederland. The couple moved to Denver in 1940 and then came to Greeley in 1959, where he taught in various Weld County schools. He played with the Clay Taylor Band for twelve years and taught private students on clarinet, flute and saxophone. Al worked for several years with disabled children, had a rhythm band at Kenton Manor, was a member of the Swingin' Seniors group, and conducted the Kitchen Band at Bonell Retirement Community and a "Flying Squadron" group at Fairacres Manor. He was a member of the Musicians Association. He died November 3, 1980.

Scope and Content

Collection of Richard Allen Moorman, also known as Al Moorman, consisting of photographs, music and music booklets, music programs, scrapbooks, northeastern Colorado information, Moorman family documents, and a small amount of railroad and streetcar information. Photographs include of images of Al Moorman conducting bands, Clay Taylor and his Band, the Jolly Corks of the Denver Elks, Edgar Allan Moorman and Dorothy Alice Moorman, Al Moorman portraits, the Ault High School marching band, the Colorado Ramblers, orchestras, and the Ault streetcar,

Documents consist of correspondence, legal documents, autobiographical information, "The Milliken Mail", receipts, and documents related to the death of Gertrude G. Moorman. Music includes "Towns of Colorado", "Fleas", "Los Tigres Magnificos", Possum Gravy", "Let's Play", "Circus Days", "Cinco de Mayo", "Jolly Corks", and "Star Spangled Banner". Other documents include programs for the United States Marine Band, the 1970 Summer Symphonic Band of the University of Northern Colorado, the Adult Recreation Band, and the Greeley Musicians Association, and a Sterling Theatre floor plan.

One scrapbook contains writings about the Denver-Greeley electric street car. Another scrapbook is titled "Show Biz Was Never Like This" and contains poems or lyrics and programs. There is also one phonograph record of the U.S. Marine Corps, and a booklet on Farming in Northeastern Colorado.
