Administrative/Biographical History

The Kurtz family

The Kurtz family emigrated to the United States of America in 1909 from Kautz, Russia (Verschinka). Kautz, Russia housed thirty emigrant families from nearby German villages in 1767. George Philipp and Eva (Busch) Frank had six children including: Elizabeth "Effie" Kurtz, Elizabeth Lind, Mary Lind, Philip Frank, Mollie Zwetzig, and one unknown child. The Kurtz family came to America by ship owned by Nord Deutsches Lloyd. Upon return to Europe, the ship sank. The Kurtz's were involved in farming and with the Great Western Sugar Company in Windsor, Colorado. Lineage is traced back to Johannes Frank; one of the original thirty who migrated to Kautz in 1767. The Busch family tree is traced through Phillip Busch.

Elizabeth "Effie" (Frank) Kurtz

Elizabeth Kurtz was born in Kautz Russia on July 17, 1892. She was the daughter of Eva (Busch) Frank and George Philipp Frank. She came to the United States of America with her siblings, Elizabeth Lind, Mary Lind, Philip Frank, Mollie Zwetzig, and an unknown child. She married William Kurtz in Windsor, Colorado, on January 25, 1914. She bore four children: Eva "Effie" Brunner, Henry William Kurtz, Mary Ring, and Ruth Rice. She is also the grandmother of Edmund Ring.

William Kurtz

William Kurtz was born in Russia in 1890, and married Effie Frank in 1914. Together, they had four children: Eva "Effie" (Kurtz) Brunner, Henry William Kurtz, Mary (Kurtz) Ring, and Ruth (Kurtz) Rice. William came to Colorado in 1910, and worked for the City of Windsor, Colorado and Great Western Sugar Company. He was a member of the Bethel American Lutheran Church in Windsor.

Eva "Effie" (Kurtz) Brunner

Eva "Effie" Kurtz was a major contributor to the German Russian Shanty (beet) Project. This project was an attempt to document the histories of German-Russian families who immigrated to the United States of America, specifically in Northern Colorado. Centennial Village was the host of this project and provided a historical information about Germans from Russia.

Ruth (Kurtz) Rice

Ruth Rice was the daughter of Effie Frank and William Kurtz. She had three siblings: Eva "Effie" Brunner, Henry William Kurtz, and Mary Ring. Ruth graduated from Windsor High School in 1946 and from the University of Northern Colorado (UNCO) in 1950. She taught English and Social Studies at Ft. Lupton Junior High. She also volunteered at the Weld Food Bank and Greeley History Museum. She and her sister, Eva Brunner, were major contributors to the Germans from Russia Beet Shanty project. This project was an attempt to document the histories of Germans from Russia families who immigrated to the United States of America, specifically in Northern Colorado.

Scope and Content

This collection includes information about the ancestors and members of the Rice family spanning back to Johannes Friedrick Kurtz (d.1769) and Philip Busch (d. 1768). This collection also includes various memorabilia (clothing and toys), religious and non-religious books and paraphernalia, family genealogy, and papers related to the implementation of the Germans from Russia beet shanty at Centennial Village Museum.
